### My Hobby



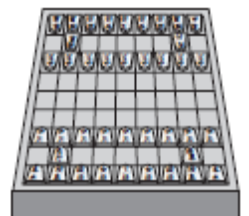

A lot of chess fans of different ages usually played chess there. Some people were really good and I learned a lot of things from them. In my school, there was a chess tournament during winter vacation. So, I played in it last year, but I was too nervous and didn't play chess well because we were watched by many people during the games. I was defeated soon in the first game. So, I practiced very hard for this year's tournament. I played games with some friends and some teachers for two weeks before the tournament, and I read chess books at home. Then, finally, I got the second prize.



[3] My favorite chess player is Garry Kasparov. He was the World Chess Champion from 1985 to 1993. Some people think he was the best player in the history of chess. I bought some books about him and read them. I liked his games very much. But 1997, he was defeated by a computer. After that, some computers often defeated the best chess players of the world.

[4] When I came to Japan, I wanted to join a chess club. But chess is not popular in Japan and there is no chess club in our school. Later, I found the *shogi* club in our school, and I thought, "*shogi* looks very similar to chess." So, I joined the club to learn *shogi*, and I needed some days to understand

(1) 1つひとつ本文と見比べていく。

ア Many people played chess in the city park on weekends.

→ On weekends, I sometimes went to the city park to play chess with other people.  
A lot of chess fans of different ages usually played chess there.

【アの文は、2文の内容を1文にまとめたもの。】

イ Tom didn't like playing chess with the people in the park.

→ Some people were really good and I learned a lot of things from them.

【イの文は、この文の内容と合わない。 good と didn't like はイメージが合わない。】

ウ Tom didn't play in the chess tournament last year, because he wasn't a good player.

→ there was a chess tournament during winter vacation. So, I played in it last year

【ウの文は、この文の内容と合わない。】

エ People must not practice before a chess tournament.

→ So, I practiced very hard for this year's tournament.

【エの文は、この文の内容と合わない。】

【アの文は、この文の内容と合わない。 8年間チャンピオンだった。】

イ Kasparov read Tom's books and became the best chess player in 1985.

→ I bought some books about him and read them.

【イの文は、この文の内容と合わない。 主語が入れ替わっている。】

正誤問題で主語の入れ替えはよくある手段だ！



ウ Kasparov didn't have to play chess with Tom, but he played in 1993.

→ 1993 年に関する記述は、「1985 年から 1993 年までチャンピオンだった。」しかない。

【ウの文は、書かれていない。書かれていないことは間違いになる。想像はダメ！】

エ Kasparov played chess very well, and some books about him were written.

→ Some people think he was the best player in the history of chess. I bought some books about him and read them.

【エの文は、この 2 文をまとめたもの。「本を買った」＝「本が書かれている」】

ア Tom finally joined a chess club, but he always played *shogi* with other students.

→ there is no chess club in our school.

【アの文は、この文に合わない。チェス部がないのに参加できない。】

イ Tom likes *shogi* because it is exciting, but he thinks it is more difficult than chess.

→ I think *shogi* is more difficult than chess, and it's as exciting as chess.

【イの文は、この文の言い換え。】

ウ Tom didn't understand *shogi* because he doesn't know Japanese.

→ I needed some days to understand its rules well.

【ウの文は、この文と合わない。ルールを理解するのに数日が必要 → 理解した】

エ Tom doesn't want to play *shogi*, but he wants to play chess with other students.

→ If you want to play *shogi* with me or want to learn chess, we can help ( )

でもチェスはとても伝統的なゲーム（遊び）で世界中で人気なんです。

About 500,000,000 people play it. 約5億人の人がそれをしています。

② When I was in the United States, I was one of the best chess players in my school.

アメリカにいたとき、私は学校で一番いいプレーヤー（指し手）の1人でした。

On weekends, I sometimes went to the city park to play chess with other people.

週末には、ときどき他の人とチェスをするために公園に行っていました。

A lot of chess fans of different ages usually played chess there.

違う年齢のたくさんのチェスファンがたいていそこでチェスをしていました。

Some people were really good and I learned a lot of things from them.

本当にいい人たちもいて、彼らからたくさんのことを学びました。

In my school, there was a chess tournament during winter vacation.

私の学校では、冬休み中にチェスのトーナメントがありました。

So, I played in it last year, but I was too nervous and didn't play chess well because we were watched by many people during the games. だから、私は昨年それに出ました。
